Sport and Recreation Management Course Information

Why study Sport and Recreation Management?

Sport means all forms of physical activity which, through casual or organised participation, aim at expressing or improving physical fitness and mental well-being, forming social relationships or obtaining results in competition at all levels. It includes competitive sport, outdoor pursuits, aesthetic movement and conditioning.

The sport and recreation industry has grown significantly in the last decade. The increasing professionalism of the National Governing Bodies and growing investment by local authorities and commercial organisations have led to an increase in employment opportunities within this industry. Alongside this, the work of professional bodies has led to an increase in expectations of the level of qualification and training of those employed within the industry (HLST, 2005).



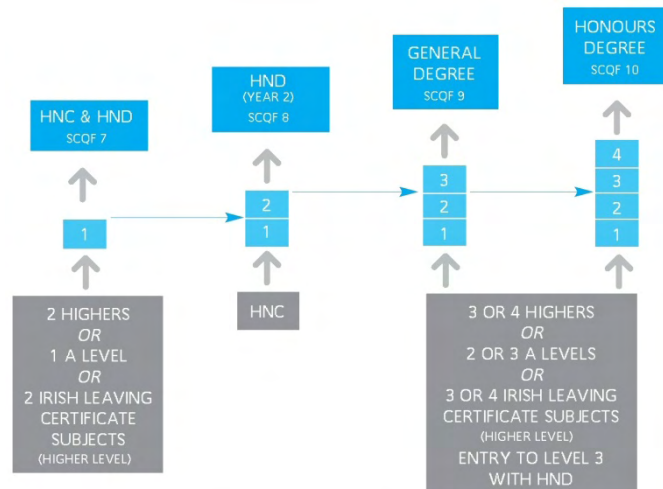
The programme in Sport and Recreation Management has been carefully developed taking into consideration the relevant QAA Subject Benchmark Statement and guidance from The Higher Education Academy (HLST) and the relevant Sector Skills Council (SkillsActive) representing employers in the sector. This modern programme includes the study of health, physical activity and exercise, and addresses the social, cultural and management aspects of sport provision.

SAC's Sport and Recreation programme is ideal for those who are keen to develop their own interests in this area and develop the performance potential in others. Through theoretical and practical modules the awards within this programme aim to provide an understanding of the sports industry and the knowledge and skills required for a career within this sector.

Qualifications to suit your needs

Our role is to help you achieve your true potential. This is why we have designed many of our courses to allow progression from one academic level to the next, with the possibility of a qualification at the end of each academic year (HNC, HND, degree, or Honours degree).

If, for some reason, you do have to leave before achieving an Honours degree, you needn't leave empty handed. Similarly, you may enrol for the HNC or HND, and as long as your performance is good enough, you can transfer to the degree course without any loss of time or repeated years.



SAC also makes provision for holders of many HNCs or HNDs from elsewhere to transfer to the second or third years, as appropriate, of a suitable HND or degree.

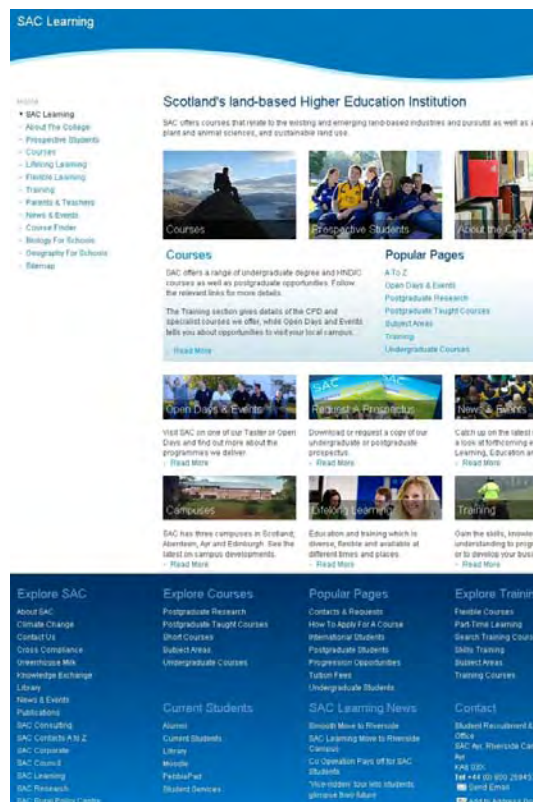
SAC... a unique institution

Methods of delivery and assessment

Within this programme the emphasis is on the principle of student-centred learning. Whilst traditional lectures will be used to impart factual information they will be supplemented extensively by other methods of teaching and learning. Such techniques include: practical sessions, guest speakers, group exercises, workshops, seminars, tutorials, site visits to industry, role-play, group discussions and case studies. Appropriate teaching & learning methods are selected in relation to the content of each module.

Entry Qualifications

- **Direct entry to Degree programmes:** Typically three Scottish Highers/ Irish Leaving Certificate subjects at Higher level (BCC) or two A-Levels (CC).

Many subjects are appropriate as previous study. In all cases, evidence of literacy at Higher level, or equivalent, is required. Applicants with Access courses are also strongly encouraged to apply.

Those with the HND in Sport and Recreation Management or similar are encouraged to apply for entry into year 3 of the degree.

Practical Requirements – Sport, Tourism and Outdoor Pursuits Courses

SAC offers a suite of sport, tourism and outdoor pursuits courses, details of which can be found on our web site. These courses are truly vocational with particular emphasis on physical activities. Certain modules involve a level of pre-skill and performance competence:

Outdoor Pursuits modules include practical sessions in hill walking, kayaking and climbing which require a level of fitness, stamina, and physical endurance. These modules are core for the Outdoor Pursuits Management and Activity Tourism courses.
